## **Principal's Message**

I write with the arrogant belief that you are all completely interested in what I am thinking, wanting, or considering. Then reality drops on my head much like the apple falling from the tree when Isaac Newton discovered gravity. Now whether that anecdote is accurate is not for me to debate but the symbolism of that moment is that there are forces which govern motions and that is what my message is about.

#### STAND

The forces of positive relationships is what governed the motion to create STAND. A few newsletters ago I talked to the process of STAND being about us all noticing and reporting dysfunctional relationships or ill treatment of others. But there was also reference to this process allowing for: hearing both sides, restoration of mana and a repairing of harm. There is a point at which discipline might need to happen, but it is not a first resort.

#### **Restorative Practices**

The Staff Only day we had on October 29<sup>th</sup> was all about Restorative Practices. So what is it? What is Restorative Practice? It is a practice that focuses on building and maintaining positive and respectful relationships across school communities, Restorative Practice give school staff best practice tools and techniques to maintain and restore relationships if things go wrong. Restorative Practice has these underlying principles:

- Positive interpersonal relationships are a major influence on behaviour
- A culture of care supports the mana of all individuals in the school community
- Cultural responsiveness is key to creating learning communities of mutual respect and inclusion.
- A restorative approach leads to individuals taking responsibility for their behaviour.

Restorative Practice is currently in more than 300 schools in New Zealand. Feedback from secondary schools participating in pilot testing of Restorative Practice (2011) showed the following positive outcomes (note I was in one of these schools):

- a calmer school environment, with less classroom disruption and more time for teaching
- an increase in the engagement and learning of students in the classroom
- growth in relational and problem-solving skills, both for adults and students across the school community
- improvements in attitudes and relationships across the whole school community
- a consistent best-practice approach across the whole school community that aligns with the school's shared values.

STAND has this practice as one of its components to resolve issues where relationships have broken down. It is meant to be non-punitive so that individuals grow from the process.

Students are using the process which is not a signal of a greater issue, rather it is a signal of trust in what it can offer, and that is to be celebrated.

#### Hīkoi mō Te Tiriti

This week Alexandra Read spoke eloquently at a recent assembly about Dame Whina Cooper's life journey ( the woman for whom Cooper House is named). The timing of her presentation and the Hikoi now being undertaken across the motu were, and are, impeccably synonymous. So, if I reference my original notion, this is a force of passion to govern a motion of change. That is what the Hikoi that will land at Parliament on the 19<sup>th</sup> will hope to do. At a fundamental level for educators 'this Kaupapa has the force to help engage ākonga to learn and better understand who Māori are as tangata whenua and how we can live together peacefully with Manaakitanga, whanaungatanga, aroha and Kaitiakitanga in our beautiful country'.

#### 'Gosh I wish I had said that'

There are always those moments when someone says out loud just what was on the tip of your tongue. This one of those "I was going to say that" moments.

The Trans-Tasman Conference held in Christchurch had many moments of 'forces which govern motions'. Hana O'Regan made a comment that educational leaders have a duty to know stories of our `akonga/learners. I would suggest that also stretches to the people we work with and the parents who choose us. Ms O'Regan said 'We must understand the impact of the narratives. How they feel, engage and participate'. What are the motions governed by this? How we show respect to knowledge, culture and language'.

Gilbert Enoka was the All-Black's Manager for leadership and I am going to leave you with some of his, as he called them principles for leading any group. I am going to call them 'forces':

- No Silver bullets. Magic is in the mahi.
- Work smart and hard
- All students have a wish bone, back bone, and a funny bone.
- Obstacles usually mean you are on the right track.
- Just hoping will not work in parachuting
- Be where your feet are. Be in the conversation, with your mind and body in the same place.
- The language you use matters.

In short, one of my motions is to continue to change how I look at things then the things I look at will change. At the end of the day intentions should lead to actions. The intention to nurture wonderful relationships was followed by the 'decisive action' for change which was STAND. Just as Newton's curiosity about gravity translated into a deep and lasting scientific principle, or Apple's vision of enhancing daily life through technology resulted in industry-shaping products, intentions in life must be followed by decisive actions to create meaningful change. Without action, even the most thoughtful intentions remain just ideas.
